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


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BLUE **ECHOES**



"Can I have a vodka with orange juice and lots of ice"? Egypt Air, air hostess looks at me with stoically, responding after what seemed an eternity- placing a juice glass sans vodka she says, "Sorry sir but alcohol is not served on this flight". It seemed like a bad start to an anticipated journey but with little option left, I settle just for juice.

The aircraft is amazingly silent, oblivious to the barren desert that lies beneath its belly. It has been a while since takeoff from Cairo airport and the flirting with the Mediterranean Sea coastline, the plane romances with the ochre and blue hues. Aboard the Egypt Air flight, I take a snooze trying to fight my excitement of what Morocco has to offer.

I awaken in time to see the Atlas Mountains with their snow-smeared peaks, North Africa's highest mountain range in the distance as the terrain turns green. Atlas mountains stretch across Morocco, Algeria and Tunis marking a striking contrast and barrier between the arid Sahara and the humming coastline of Morocco.

Close enough, one can see the russet slopes dotted with pines and cedar, the green valley winding past goats and leading to Berber villages.

The last line of the movie Casablanca, spoken by Humphrey Bogart comes to my mind as I tell myself "Rahul, I think this is the beginning of a beautiful friendship." Seat belt sign comes on as I watch the city of Casablanca taking shape. Earlier in the century as the French were looking to build this city, the architects flew over this very land and had it designed from the air, the first of its kind. Big cities, I avoid like the plague but Casablanca for me has been an image as an unsung jewel of Morocco.

Crisp blue skies and breeze with a nip greet us as we land and soon we are chugging along the road to Rabat. Deciding to begin the journey from Rabat, our central point of stay, it allowed easy access to the Northern end of Meknes and Fez

and down south to Marrakesh. Palm-lined roads, lush greenery outside European style houses, the city greets you with its laid back vibe. Driving slowly, the French influences can be seen in abundance but my heart is with the blushing hibiscus bushes as I roll down the window and inhale the heady scent of orange blossom. This capital city of Rabat may be in the shadows of its big brother Casablanca but it holds its own elegant charm.

Rabat has a shared heritage, one as the modern capital and the other where its ancient remains are still intact. Dividing the city sightseeing into two parts; we decide to commence our journey with a visit to Marinid Necropolis at Chellah. Gulping the not too hot mint tea, a national beverage and quite like a religious ceremony, we were already racing to reach the 14th-century necropolis built by Sultan al-Hassan.

Standing at the entry of the palace, the city noises dims and a peaceful atmosphere prevails. The challah is both a Roman ruin and an Islamic Burial place, both claimed without any bias by the storks whose large nests perch on top of the minarets. It seems like the city has new sentinels guarding its heritage. The bustling trading post on the mouth of the river BouRegreg lies in scattered ruins amidst ageing fruit trees and cats that seem to have found new playgrounds. Time in Chellah stands still.

The Moroccan sun is fast disappearing behind the Palace walls, sinking in the river as we decide to call it a day and sleep early.

It has rained during the night as we traverse the wet lawn with the wheels of the suitcase refusing to roll over. Our guide and Chauffer give us a helping hand as we settle in the minivan, which seems equally eager to discover the historic cities of the African continent.

The drive is a short one and time slips easily. The modern city is left behind as a beautiful landscape opens up its arms, reaching the dark blue sky. The scenario changes quickly from palms and orange





trees to olive farms, undeveloped, grassy and sandy plots as we find ourselves close to the third-largest city of Morocco-Fez is also known as Fes which is not only a spiritual capital but also hold the old world charm as the capital of medieval Morocco. Within a few hours, modernity is replaced with carts laden with oranges and other colourful vegetables and children playing with marbles. The gravel road ends at BorjSud, the southern hills of Fes offering a panoramic view of the city. As we stretch our legs, vestiges of the fortress in ruins stand yellowed against a greying sky. I walk to the edge of the cliff where a meadow of grazing sheep feasts on the grass uncaring of the cemetery downhill painted in white. On the other side of the hill is the view of Fes el Bali, protected by high walls, the medina imposing with its 9000 unnamed alleys housing 200,000 people. The only sound is of the breeze but I knew that closer to the Medina, it would a world within a world.

Finding ourselves in a "riad", a traditional Moroccan house, the breeze cuts across the courtyard reminding us that away from the Moroccan sun, it could be cold, a stark contrast just like this country itself. Its already lunch and we are hungry as hell. I love eating and for me, Moroccan food was turning out to be a feast.

My first encounter with tagine is in Fes itself. After having a taste of the dish, I am made aware that tagine is not only a dish but also the name of the utensil, cookware itself. Food cooked in clay utensils retains the natural flavours of the dish. Savouring my lamb tagine with dried prunes and vegetables, I relish the spices that lead to the conquering of nations.

Food makes us lazy but we are also mindful of the sunset that does not seem to be that far away. Spreading a printed map of the city, we opt for some sightseeing spots that were in walking distance. Bab Boujloud, the most famous gate of Fez and entrance to the medina is close by and soon

we find ourselves standing under its mighty arch admiring the Arabic-Andalusian design that combines blue and jade zelliges with scroll-shaped cutouts. This was the opening to the heart of the Medina.

The narrow cobbled street spirals downwards with streams of people crawling like ants on a mission. Mules push their way through as vendors wave their hands frantically and beckon you to come close. Old women sitting in the doorways, stalls brewing mint tea, leather skins on the roof, smaller alleys leading to God knows where - the sounds, sights and smell immediately consume us as I realize that I had forgotten to write the name of the gate, one of the twelve, through which we had entered. The feeling that we are already lost comes naturally as we willingly lose ourselves to the crowd. In the land of no directions, no GPS MedersaBouInania building looks at me, inviting me to its beautiful confines.

From the maze of dark passages and stained blue walls, this medersa spellbound me, first with its silence and then with its intricate motifs and designs covering every inch of the building. Built-in 14th century, this place housed students of Theology. Sitting under the green-tiled roofs, I am transported back in time allowing myself rest from the maddening Medina.

Later in the evening, freshly squeezed orange juice rehydrates me. Taking a break from the memories of the Medina, I realize that beyond the overwhelming architecture, it is the Moroccans themselves that make the country so friendly and inviting.

The next day, we travel to the far reaches of Rome. Yes, you read that right. Volubilis, Morocco's grand Roman city was once a very fertile area and was ruled under descendant of Cleopatra. The rich history of the place fascinates me just as much as the lush green fields at the base of Rif Mountains that slope upwards to meet the deep dark blue sky. Murder, Mosaic and Magnificence can all be found here interwoven in history and draped in intrigue. Roman Emperor Augustus, Caligula, Marcus Aurelius- all ruled this





empire, one way or another.

The ruins are small but spectacular. The most notable structure is the House of Orpheus, which is adorned beautiful mosaics, one showing the son of Hercules. My moment of glory is the magnificent triumphal arch dedicated to Emperor Caracalla who is 212 AD offered Roman citizenship so all inhabitants of the Roman Empire.

In the distance, on the other side of Volubilis, one can see the whitewashed town of MoulayIdrisZerhoun, Founder of the Idrdrid dynasty of Morocco in 787. A very small town sitting astride two green hills is the most important Islamic city of Morocco and also the most neglected and not popular with the tourists. Perhaps its lack of popularity and inaccessibility has helped the town retain its quintessential charm. This is even though MoulayIdris demolished parts of the city to build his new palaces in Meknes.

As someone wisely said, "Between the ruins and the holy city, only a couple miles apart sit two amazing symbols of the importance of the past, and the importance of the present".

Well there it was and time to see what MoulayIdris new places looked like that housed four wives and hundreds of concubines and am not counting his offspring's. It is said that he admired his contemporary, Louis XIV of France and wanted to make Meknes his version of Versailles.

Meknes is slow during the day with hardly any tourists, which meant good news. The town is almost sleepy, quiet with white walls and pastel streets. Remnants of fortifications and The King's tomb sit at the heart of the city along with the strange attraction of a vast old prison. An unwarranted tour by a young guy who cannot speak English insists on showing how the Christians were hanged, chained and tortured before the kill. When he realizes that we will not be giving him a bakshish he parts with a grunt leaving us in the cool and ochre confines of the underground prison.


The souks in Meknes Medina almost circle the Great Mosque- colourful and vibrant they are noisy and full of the unexpected. Picking up some blue pottery things, I make a quick exit to walk over to the gate of Bab- al Mansour. It is almost impossible to take any photographs with tens of selfie sticks and camera lovers obstructing the view of this beautiful structure made in the 18th century.


Tucking in the Museum of Moroccan Art (Dar Jamai), jaw-dropping treasures enclosed in this small space are a true marvel. Belonging to minsters of Moulay, one can see the opulence in the intricate decoration, art deco on wood and the Andalusian garden housing many fruit trees. The courtyard is shady and peaceful with the bokeh of orange cast by its fruit trees.

Meknes Ville nouvelle is like one crazy circus as we find the contrast with the quiet Medina a few kilometres away The Mediterranean boulevards and cafes are alive, locals playing music, food all around, sparking lights – every seat seems to have been taken and all cafes looked packed. Struggling to find a place, we wander around, lost to the noise and endless sights of street food.

Finding a table at a French restaurant seems to be a lucky straw. Not being able to make much sense of the dishes, we leave the ordering to a young waitress who babbled in French and all I could say was NO Parlez-vousFrancias. Struggling to make sense, I show her a dish on an adjacent table and suddenly a smile formed on her lips. I did not know what to make of the change in her behaviour. Vegetables with chickpea and two pieces of lamb sit before me smiling and ready to be devoured. Sumptuous and tasty to the hilt, it seemed like a perfect day to end in Meknes.

Meknes to Marrakesh is a huge contrast. This is where the cultural confluence of Africa, Europe and the Middle East meet. The city of Maghreb founded almost 1000 year ago. Sitting on the edge of the Sahara desert, the pink pise palaces with the snow-





capped Atlas Mountains in the backdrop; Marrakesh comes across as a city steeped in tradition and yet layered with modernity. Pulling myself from the van, I find myself at the souk and after having taken the headlong challenge of Fez, the adventures of navigating the heady tangle of shops seems easy. Freshly dyed wool in riots of orange and reds make an attractive collage, wooden carts crammed with blue pottery tiles and brass lanterns thrown everywhere as I take a pause standing under a shop in the slanted shadows under a bamboo roof.

The gardens of Marrakesh steal my heart. From the 800-year-old Agdal, this place is also referred to as the Versailles of Islam to the little sister of Agdal, the Menera, similar in design but small in area. The Badi palace is a lively square with its solitary palm tree casting in the shadows of the water tank. At the heart of the complex lie the ruins of Sultan Mansour's home with pavilions and sunken gardens.

But if there was a place which took my breath away was the Bahia Palace. Aptly titled Bahia, pronounced as ba-ha-ha, meaning brilliance in Arabic, was built by Abu 'Bou' Ahmed, a slave who went on to become a vizier. Constructed on a 2-acre plot boasting of 150 rooms including a section for the harem, the palace has an abundance of stained glass, hand-carvedd huge wooden doors and mosaic tile. The pandemonium caused by the overzealous tourists wanting a perfect selfie and their noise is amplified by the courtyard design.

The crowded lanes of Medina, an old part of Marrakesh offer little respite from the noise. Portable radios blaring music, buzzing scooters and the hawkers doing their best to get to you, the beguiling interplays continue.

The only heaven of tranquillity available, or so it seemed is JardinMajorell, window to a secret garden. The place is located on a quiet side street in the upscale neighbourhood of Guéliz. I step into a small but intimate courtyard with a fountain. Majorelle took almost 40 years to plant about 135 species of plants turning this




property in an enchanting landscape. Creating his version of blue trademarked as bleu Majorelle, he painted his building with his colour.

Fashion designer Yves Saint Laurent made Morocco his second home and bought this property after Jardin's death where own ashes lie scattered in the rose garden.

This was the fastest week that I have ever lived and yet one with immense memories. The last evening of my stay in Morocco draws close at the famous Rick's Café in Casablanca. Tired and overwhelmed, I put my head in the tiny cup of coffee and let my swirling mind rest from the overdose of history, architecture and Morocco itself. Brassy saxophone from Glenn Miller plays and a beautiful Ingrid Bergman flirts with Bogart on a widescreen screen playing in an endless loop with subtitles. The lounge felt intimate and somewhat glamorous.


In the sombre mood of leaving behind a great country and its people, the jostle and bustle of people, their warmth and to being lost under the blue sky – Morocco was more than a country and people, it was an experience itself.



The most effective skill of all must come from within as a drive along with the passion to tackle any situation that comes forth. 3 cups All purpose flour

3 cups granulated sugar

3 tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

1 cup unsalted butter, softened

1 Tbsp vanilla extract

1 cup whole milk room temperature

2/3 cup vegetable oil

3 eggs, room temperature

VIBGYOR Food coloring

Whipping cream (as required)

Tools:

7 six inche pans

7 bowls

Rubber spatula

Offset Spatula

Method

Preheat the oven at 170C and Grease all the 7 pans. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Add the eggs in 2 parts. Mix until the eggs are fully incorporated and emulsion is formed.

Mix milk and oil in a bowl.

Add milk and oil alternatively with dry ingredients.

Combine until the batter is smooth

Divide the batter in 7 equal parts and color them by adding few drops of food coloring.

Bake them at 170C for 15-20 mins or until the toothpick comes


Note: Each oven works differently so keep an eye on the cake after 12 mins as the layers of the rainbow cake will be very thin. Defrost the whipping cream and whip it for 5 to 8 mins or until soft peaks are formed. Add some vanilla (optional) You can also soak your cake with simple syrup (1 part sugar and 1 part water). Level the cakes by removing the domes form top. Frost each layer with whipping cream.



World of Wines and THE FESTIVAL OF COLORS

We left of in the previous issue on pairing wines with foods. Hope you have had a chance to try some of the mentioned wines with your favorite dishes in that article.

In this issue, we will focus on wine cock tails and mock tails or non alcoholic beverages.

As the festival of colors approaches traditionally known as 'HOLI'. I thought of providing some unique ways to involve wines and create a few good cocktails using the wines. To add a few interesting non alcoholic beverages especially for kids.

Let us begin with the famous red wine Sangria. There several ways to create and enjoy the Spanish cocktail, traditionally made with red wine, cubes or chopped fruits and brandy or orange juice with a dash of cane sugar syrup.

A Pinot Noir wine, not too expensive, is a lighter choice that will bring upfront fruitiness to your Sangria as compared to a Cabernet Sauvignon with loads of aromas like blackcurrant and cocoa or coffee.

As mentioned in the earlier articles, your palate is the best judge to enjoy your wine.

What is involved in making sangria?

Red Wine Sangria

Chopped Fruits (Pear, Apple, Peach, Orange, Strawberries, Raspberries, Cherry's) The fruits can be cut into small cubes and keep some sliced for garnishing the glass or jar


50 ml Cane sugar 50 ml Brandy

2 whole Lemons

Club soda to top it off before serving to give that fizz... Now that we have all our ingredients, we can go ahead and mix them together. To start with, cut cubes of apples, lemon, oranges and strawberries into a glass jar. Pour your choice of red wine into the glass jar. Add 50 ml of the cane sugar syrup Add Brandy (on how strong you would like the sangria to be) Once all the ingredients are in the glass jar, refrigerate the glass jar over night so the sangria is chilled and the fruits have now infused well with the beverages.

Before serving, just add a dash of club soda for the fizz.. Or you can do without it and enjoy!

3 scoops vanilla ice cream in a tall glass Pure orange juice over the ice cream Top it with a dash of sprite Fresh fruits mocktail



When Krishna came to visit Radha and teased her and her friends, he was chased away by the ladies in Barsana. The tradition is kept alive today as men from Nandgaon visit Barsana to be hit by women with sticks. They have to protect

The legends around Holi signify the triumph of good over evil. Once there was a demon king, Hiranyakashyap, whose son Prahlad refused to worship him. He was a devotee of Lord Vishnu, while his father wanted everyone in the kingdom to worship him. Disappointed, he asked his sister Holika to sit in blazing fire with Prahlad, wanting the latter to die. Holika's boon of being unharmed by fire did not work, and she died. Prahlad was saved as





he kept chanting Lord Vishnu's name, who blessed the devotee and saved his life. In many parts, effigies of Holika are burnt to mark this.

In yet another folklore, an ogress
Pootna was appointed by Lord Krishna's
uncle, Kansa, to kill him. When she
disguised and offered to feed baby Krishna,
he sucked her blood and laid her to death.
Effigies of Pootna are also burnt to signify
end of darkness. In the southern parts of
India, Lord Kaamadeva is worshipped, to
depict the sacrifice he made for the worldly
beings. When Lord Shiva was in deep
meditation over the loss of Sati, the worldly
affairs went awry and gods requested the
deity of love and passion to shoot his love



arrow on Shiva to bring him back to his original self. Angered, Shiva opened his third eye and burnt Kaamadeva to ashes. Bereaved wife Rati prayed to Shiva to revive Kaamadeva, to which he agreed. It is believed that Kaamadeva was burnt on the day of Holi. It is thus called Kamavilas, Kaman Pandigai and Kama Dahanam. Celebrations and festivities galore

For places associated with Radha and Krishna, Holi brings with it colours and mischief out in the open, as the towns of Mathura, Vrindavan, Barsana and Nandgaon come alive on the occasion of Holi.

"Yashomatimaiya se bole Nandlala, Radha kyun gori, main kyun kala". The song translates to English as- Nandlala (Krishna) complains to his mother Yashoda about his complexion being darker than Radha's. To this, Yashoda asked him to colour Radha's face in whichever colour he wanted, making her look like him. Playful young Krishna applied colour on Radha and other gopis using water guns, and that tradition turned into a festival.

The entire country celebrates Holi, as do the Indian diaspora in other parts of the world. Australia, Bangladesh, Canada, Malaysia, Nepal, Trinidad and Tobago, United Kingdom, and United States of America are drenched in the colours of



Holi. Nepal celebrates Holi as a national festival, with goddess Saraswati being worshipped in Vajrayogini temples.

With tropical rainforests in abundance and Fort Zeelandia present, the Phagwa festival (as it is called here) is celebrated as a national holiday in Suriname. It is customary to wear old whites when playing with colours here. Close byin Guyana, known for its cricket and calypso music, the main celebrations in the capital Georgetown are held at Mandir in Prashad Nagar.

In the South Pacific, in the archipelago of over 300 islands, Fijians celebrate Holi by singing folksongs called PhaagGaaian celebrating the love of Radha Krishna. Straight from a postcard perfect picture, Bali in Indonesia celebrates Holi enthusiastically. Mauritius in the Indian Ocean is home to beaches and lagoonsknown the world over. The festivities in Mauritius around Holi celebrate the beginning of spring and is celebrated with great fervour. Further

North in the United Kingdom, Holi is a jamboree of colours and merriment, as people enjoy the festival of colours. Across the Atlantic Ocean, the United States is home to a large number of Hindu believers, who participate in the revelries of Holi. Revelries colouring India in all shades

Closer home in Vrindavan, Holi is a 16-day long festival. Special rituals are performed in praise of Lord Krishna.


Earthen pots filled with butter are hung high for boys and men to reach. Women make the task harder by throwing coloured water on them and signing songs. In the last few years, widows in Vrindavan, along with those from Varanasi, have started celebrating Holi, with colours anointing not only their joyous faces but lives as well. As colours of Holi paint their plain white saris, the happiness is evident in their smiles, in their laughter.

History has it that the freedom fighters who fought in India's revolt of 1857 had organised a fair in Kanpur. This was called Ganga Mela as it was held along the banks of river Ganga, and continues to be organised till date. Holi is given a musical touch by the neighbours in Uttarakhand, who celebrate Baitihki Holi, Khari Holi and Mahila Holi, with Holiyars singing classical ragas. Punjab celebrates Hola Mohalla, a 3-day event where martial arts are depicted, fairs are held, and folk theatrical performances take place. Guru Gobind Singh had initiated this, the last of ten Sikh gurus.

Pushkar in Rajasthan is a special place on Holi. A holy town, it is suggested to keep your camera ready- waterproofed and on a full battery- because there are going to be a plethora of pictures and videos. At least a thousand people with hands up in the air, dancing to the techno music, covered in blue, green, pink, red, yellow, all wet and happy would greet you here.

Not without Gujiya, Kaanji and Bollywood!

Any festivity is incomplete without



food and music. Gujiya, a deep-fried sweet packing milk solids and dried fruits in a flour shell, is especially made on Holi. It is a hard to resist delicacy, and nothing makes Holi better than Gujiya. With lots of carbs going inside our bodies, a drink to cool it all down is essential. Kaanji does wonders for this. Beetroot infested tangy water is taken in copious amounts by everyone as they enjoy the Holi celebrations. Bollywood fulfilled our wishes as it created many songs for the festival. Peppy thumping music, dancing people with faces coloured, and food to keep the energy levels high-Holi is a beautiful celebration of the oncoming spring and summer.

As Holi festivities spread colour and love, people are now moving to organic colours instead of chemical ones. The latter would cause skin allergies and

are now being replaced by their organic counterparts. Often, like the olden days, people use natural colours made from dried leaves and flowers. So turmeric, henna, neem, sandalwood, indigo, beetroot et cetera are used to colour each other on the colourful festival.

Holi is a celebration of spring, love, bonding, and new beginnings. People often travel to various parts of India and the world to partake in the revelry on this vibrant festival. Dear reader, go ahead and experience a different Holi this year, I encourage you to. Go explore the rituals that are followed at other places, the delicacies you can treat your taste buds to, and the addition of a new experience in your arsenal. hen we look back in our childhood, all we can see is life full of colours. Life is always full of surprises but the colour of childhood memories is something, which stays with you forever.

For me my most memorable journey has always been visiting my grandma's place, during the summer vacation.

Though, today I have travelled many places around the country and so, but the path that takes me to my Grandma's place have always remained very special.

Those were the Days.....

The train journey, the hawkers calling 'Chai-chai', the fight with sibling for the window seat, and gossip with sibling on the upper birth, these are some beautiful colorful page of my childhood.

Entire year, we used to wait for the summer vaccation, and before the vacation would start our tickets for our home-town Kolkata, would be booked in advance. Shopping for the vaccation would start a month prior to the vacation, and packing





continues till the last day before leaving the house.

Then finally the day arrives, when we would be all ready to start our journey for our most beloved place, 'Kolkata'.

There is a very beautiful song in a bengali movie, 'Kolkata, tumio hete dekho Kolkata', this song tells you if you want to see the real beauty of Kolkata, walk down the streets of Kolkata. Though, I am a Delhite, born and raised in Delhi. But the warmth, the charm of this beautiful city Kolkata, always attracts me.

Being raised by a super awesome dad, we were taught to be content and happy with whatever you have, and appreciate each moment. With these thoughts in mind, we used to start our journey, a 3-tier sleeper train journey 20years back, was so full of life, which a flight to Kolkata couldn't replace ever.


The journey used to continue with long chit chats, and enjoying every other snacks, that hawker will get, whether it is Bengal special 'Jhalmuri', or 'Ghugni', or Kanpur's famous 'Aaloo Puri'. Train from Delhi to Howrah was an overnight journey, and still is. You can sense Kolkata is not far, when you can see the change in the landscape, the leaves in the tree are greener, number of coconut trees, palm trees, Mango trees increases the more you approach towards the eastern India.

So, the next morning, small ponds in the villages, large fields of countryside welcomes you to West Bengal, and finally when you hear your parents saying, get ready 'We reached Howrah', that used to be like music to my ears.

Majestic Howrah...

'Howrah Station is one of the primary station serving Kolkata, other than 'Sealdah'. It is also one of the oldest and largest railway complex in India. Moving ahead, as we come out of the station our cousin and relatives would be waiting for us, to take us home in the Yellow Taxi.

Yes, 'Yellow Ambassador' is the Pre-Paid taxi service of Kolkata. This yellow taxi used to take us to our destination crossing the famous Howrah Bridge. Fresh breeze from the banks of river Hooghly, which flows between Kolkata and Howrah, used to make the journey much more memorable.



Howrah Bridge again has its own legendary story to tell. Howrah Bridge is the most iconic symbol and pride of the people of Kolkata. It is one of the most popular bridges in India. This bridge was made of 23,000 tons of steel by Tata Steel; however, the most interesting fact about the bridge is that there are no nuts and bolts in the structure.

Steel riveting was done in place of nuts and bolts.

The journey from the station to my grandma's place used to take an hour or so, which is little less now, thanks to the new roadways and better managed traffic. The experience of the childhood was very different from what it is now, taxi used to drop us to the nearest possible point, as the roads still used to be kuccha, and narrow, ponds were there on either side of the

lane. This is now replaced with multi-story society complexes. So, I am not really sure, whether, I am happy that now, we have proper roads, that drops us right in front of our house, or I was happy when we actually used to walk down those narrow lanes

The day in my grandma's place used to start with nice sumptuous Bengali Lunch, prepared by my aunt, which used to include, Steam Rice, Ghee (Clarified Butter), Aalu-posto bhaja (Potato Fried with poppy seeds). Bhaja mugger daal

with poppy seeds), Bhaja mugger daal (Lentil Soup), Begun Bhaja (Brinjal Fry), Macher Jhol(Light Fish Curry), Mishti Doi(Sweet Curd), and finally the Rosogolla.

And I am blessed, that even though my grandma is not anymore, but we are still served the same, with much love and warmth.

Kolkata and Bengali as a community are known for their love for food. Even when we are having lunch, in the dining table at that very moment we will be discussing some other food preparation, and will be planning for the next meals menu.

Some of the must try food that one should explore, when travelling to Kolkata are: 'Phuchka', unlike 'Golegappe', the water used in this is tamarind water, with spicy potato mash filling inside. 'Churmur' another such street food, which the same vendor can offer, which is another delicacy one must try. 'Phucka' competition with the cousins was a must, which was how many one can have. And we maintained the ritual, to have this competition even now, when we visit our hometown.


Kolkata Roll, is another mouthwatering street food which is getting quite popular these days, even outside Kolkata. The specialty is the filling inside, the ingredients used, and one such ingredient is Kasundi(close to Mustard sauce), but have its own tangy flavor.

In the main course, the most popular is Kolkata Biryani. Now, many of you may actually think, Biryani is Biryani. What is special about Kolkata Biryani? 

From Kolkata as a pivotal point, we also made it a point, to explore some new destination of West Bengal in each



This is one season romantisized by famous poets all over the world and more to come. Spring adds new life to all that is and so goes the celebration of spring all over the world.

their mirth of games during this harvest season. It felt more down to earth, raw and very close to nature spirits all coming alive, blooming with new beginning.

Dance to Glory

Mention has to be made on the rich folk dance of the Halakki tribe in the coastal areas of Uttarakannada district of Karnataka. One of their most celebrated events is called "Suggi Dance" performed during holi festival. They use unique turban which is decorated with colourful ornaments, small wooden birds, and peacock feathers which resembles a tree. A good observation can show that the steps or moves or formations can show elements of nature such as waves of the sea, curves of growing vines, flowing rivers.etc.

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Tandana Mathur comes to life on this spectacular show of nature at Fairbanks Alaska known as Northern Lights. She talks to Ritu Ghai about the visual stimulation at Alaska and how this experience has ensured her return to this place in future.

"I suddenly decided to make a trip to Fairbanks Alaska. To enjoy a few days of solitude amidst the mountain ranges, pristine rivers and lakes of this white wonderland.

In just two days I packed my bags, determined to see Northern Lights, also known as the Aurora Borealis, so often talked about by people who have travelled to this place. Although there is no guarantee that the northern lights show will happen on any particular day but the chances of seeing this phenomenon is more in late winter months, typically on nights with clear skies. Since I stay in USA, it was easy for me to plan this tour. The total trip cost me \$4600 which included the flights, hotel stay, tours and cab fare. To add to the excitement, my niece who lives in Canada decided to join me.

A 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours United Airlines flight from New Jersey took me to Seattle where I was joined by my niece. From Seattle, we took a 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours fight to Fairbanks. We reached our destination around 2 am and as soon as we stepped out of the airport, the – 20F cold air hit us hard. Despite the extreme cold, we were eager and determined to catch the Northern Lights.

From the airport, a cab took us to Aurora Villa, pre booked for our stay. We self-checked into the modern and scenic room with long windows and heated floors to brave the biting cold weather. We were aware that due to winters, the sun was up for about 5 hours only.

After a little rest, we took a heritage tour of Fairbanks the very same day. It was a breathtaking drive along trees covered in white snow, so ethereal, scenic and crystal. The cab driver took us to Denali mountain site from where we saw the peak. We went to the huge Alaskan Pipeline and then downtown to have supper at a Thai Restaurant. Being vegetarians, we were



pleased with the choices available.

We then drove to University of Alaska, from where we saw the sunset. A beautiful moment as the sun went down, leaving behind a reddish orange sky with hues of purple. Still wanting to see more, we visited the museum in the university and then drove to the city of North Pole to visit the Santa Clause Housewhere a larger than life three dimensional 50 feet statue of Santa stood alongside Santa's sleigh. The Santa Claus house is more like a gift shop with beautiful Christmas decorations and a small Santa's workshop for making toys.

After this tour, we returned to our hotel for a short relaxation.

Around 10 pm, we again went downtown for the Northern Light Tour. There were 7 people with us in the tour. The driver took us to cabin where we were provided with fresh dinner. After a while, on the advice of the guide, we stepped out at the glacial night just as hues of blue appeared. Tired but with eyes peeled to the sky, we looked forward to the appearance of Northern lights. What came next changed Alaska for me. An amazing dance of incandescent green, blue, red and purple shades painted the sky in a spellbinding colour spectacle among the twinkling stars. I heard myself gasp. As the sky became intense, more colours filled in. The guide explained that different atmospheric gases cause the different colours. I was dwarfed by this celestial show.

But one need lots of dedication and patience to wait for the perfect sight which lasts for just a few minutes before fading back to normal. We were there for about 4 hours, enjoying the sight and meal. Many tribes, people and communities believe these lights to be the harbingers of good luck. But to me it was simply the greatest natural phenomenon on earth, a lifetime experience.

The next day we took a stroll around the city, allwrapped up in 4 layers of warm clothing. We then took a tour to Chena Hot Springs, Ice Museum and Northern Lights. The Aurora Ice Museumwas an experience. The world's largest year-round ice environment had ice sculptures including entire rooms built out of ice, igloos, a giant chess set, and a full-sized pair of knights




jousting on horses. Even the entire bar is crafted from ice and the whole place is lit up with ice chandeliers.

We then went to immerse ourselves in the healing waters of mineral hot springs, where the outside temperature was -40 and inside we were covered with loads of mist as if we were the only two people there. A relaxing experience when we both has frost in our hair and eye lashes. Buried in the warm water, we looked up to see the black sky with shining stars. I would call it once in a life time experience.

After this we took dinner and drove back to our villa. On our way back we again saw the bright northern lights, flashing beautiful colors and changing shapes. There were so bright, clear and magical.

The last day was booked for dog sledding in North Pole. The morning starts with a visit by our tour advisor, Denver.
As guided, we wear snow pants and snow boots with five layer of clothes before embarking on our journey. At first instance,





I thought the dogs are doing some gruelling work. But as 8 to 10 Alaskan Huskies teamed together at the sled, I could see their excitement, aching to run. We hopped on the sled and in a while got the hang of the balance as we sleighed past snowed trees and roads. It was a surreal experience and even my eyelashes were almost frozen. After half an hour of dog sledging, we headed to have some good food at a North Pole Chinese restaurant before returning to the warmth of the villa. Next morning, we catch a flight back home. Enriched with this 3 day magical experience of sunsets and sunrises that last forever, colours that stay forever and memories that remain forever.







A few tips to future travellers:

Be Prepared - Wear clothing to protect yourself from the extreme cold conditions. Jackets, insulated pants, insulated boots, Electric hand warmers and layers of warm clothing to survive the cold.

Warm drinks—Carry insulated thermos filled with hot water, tea, or

Since it might take hours to have the Northern lights to emerge on the sky. So carry snacks and food to munch while you stay awake to view this mesmerising glimpse.

Charge your phone batteries to last a few hours while your wait outside.

Also a camera to catch these amazing lifetime moments.

Of Kangaroos and Koalas- **Australia**








The Opera House in Sydney, Great Barrier Reef in the northeast, gold reserves in the west, and vast swathes of green forests inhabited by beautiful animals-Australia has it all, and more.

About Australia

Lying between the Indian and Pacific Oceans, the continent nation is roughly divided into half by the Tropic of Capricorn running through it. The climate of the nation is favourable for the lush green cover that it is famous for. Eucalyptus trees are present here, and are home to the cute koalas. These trees have a special property of not only growing really fast, but also of conserving the water. The leaves of eucalyptus shut off the stomas and thus does not turn yellow or dried up in case of low rainfall or droughts. Also, the roots of the tree grow turning downward, which can be visualised as a cockscrew. 1766, on the ship of British Captain James Cook, eucalyptus travelled to various countries, moving out of its native environment for the first time.

Australia comprises of the mainland Australian continent, Tasmania island, Kangaroo Island, Fraser Island, and other 8200 islands within its maritime borders. Along with the capital Canberra in the southeast, most urban centres of Australia





are located on the coast, including Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth, among others.

Capital Canberra

The capital is the seat of government, and the largest inland city. It is house to the Australian War Memorial which was built to commemorate war fatalities. In the evening, a tribute called 'Last Post' is paid. Another favourite among tourists is the Lake Burley Griffin in the city centre. It is named after the city's architect. In the circumference of the Lake lie the National Gallery, National Museum, Captain Cook Memorial Jet, and the venue of the renowned Floriade festival, which celebrates spring like no other with more than a million flowers blooming.

If you are at the Australian War
Memorial, take a two kilometre walk, or
bike, or drive this distance. The path is
well paved and provides a good trail to
the Mount Ainslie. Do not forget to carry a
light jacket, breeze can make you shiver.
The view from Mount Ainslie promises
to be a delightful scene which stays with
you for long. The planning of the city
can be well appreciated from here, while
learning about the Australian battles as you
walk here. If botany piques your interest,
head straight to the National Botanic
Gardens, home to the representatives of all
important species of flora.

A two-hour drive can elevate you to a height of 2200m. Snowy Mountains are flocked by tourists all year round. You can hike at Kosciuszko Walk, or fish in the Lake Jindabyne; enjoy water sports, go for a horse ride here in summers, or just sit in the serene and peaceful environment. Winters bring with them a chill in the air and snow caps the mountains to provide for great slopes for all skiers.


Sydney: Opera House and Coathanger


Canberra lies at about a three hour drive from Sydney, the capital of New South Wales.

Sydney is synonymous with the Opera House- a multi-venue performing arts centre. Located at the Sydney Harbour, it is one of the most famous buildings built in the 20th century. It was inaugurated on 20 October 1973, with a total seating capacity of 5700 people. This is a UNESCO









World Heritage Site, designated in 2007. It is listed in the Australian National Heritage List, and in the New South Wales Heritage Register. It was designed by the Danish architect Jørn Utzon, and hosts over 1500 performances each year which have more than 1.2 million people in attendance. 8 million people visit the Opera House annually. The first performance was by Paul Robeson, who sang 'Ol' Man River' to the construction workers whilst they had their lunch. Ever since, Birgit Nilsson, Joan Sutherland, Michael Buble, have performed here, among many others. In 1990, Nelson Mandela had addressed a crowd of forty thousand here.

From books to coffees, and swimming to historical visits, Sydney has something for everyone. It is exciting to visit Sydney throughout the year. If you too enjoy the laneways meandering and beautiful restaurants serving delectable food, Angel Place in city centre is the place to go to. Dining at the harbourside is a wonderful experience in itself and must not be missed; enjoying appetising delicacies under the moonlit sky here is a must-do. At the most famous beach in Australia, Bondi Beach, check out the cafes and restaurants for splendid views and yum food.

Coathanger. That is what the locals call the Sydney Harbour Bridge. Built in 1932,

it is the world's largest steel arch bridge. Two railway lines run along its length. The panoramas of the Bridge can be taken up a notch further by climbing it on an almost 3.5 hour climb to the top of the bridge.

Madame Tussaud's, WILD LIFE Sydney Zoo, SEA LIFE Sydney Aquarium and lots of shops and restaurants dot the Darling Harbour. There is the Chinese Garden of Friendship here to satiate the souls seeking some green, while a replica of Captain Cook's ship, Endeavour, is present at the Australian National Maritime Museum. It is indeed a sight to behold as you marvel at the intricate design and beauty of the ship.

The Taronga Zoo is a delightful place to come closer to over 4000 animals. Kangaroos, emus, koalas, lemurs, lions, tigers, giraffes and seals are present here. The iconic amusement park built in the 1930s, Kuna Park sydney has a Wild Mouse rollercoaster, Tango Train, Coney Island, slideshow games and cotton candy for the little ones. And did you just say sand castles, for Sydney has numerous beaches do practice your paddling, sailing, snorkeling, kayaking or building beautiful sand castles. You can have a 360 degrees view of Sydney from the Sydney Tower Eye, looking right up to the Blue Mountains National Park.
