HOI AN - THE YELLOW CITY OF VIETNAM

traddled almost midway between the two far-flung ends - Hoi An is unmindful of the contradictory but co-existing truths in the annals of the history of Vietnam. Once caught between the twin arms of capitalism and communism, today it lives between its well-preserved past and the vibrant present, both creating magic that leaves you spellbound.

The temptation of being there and done that makes most tourists jump headlong in the two big commercialized cities of Ho Chi Minh and Hanoi. Flying over the beaches and yellowed rice fields, few realize what treasure lies below the clouds. Hoi An one of the most well preserved and now awarded the UNESCO World Heritage city tag is drawing more tourists than before and I happen to be one of them, jostling for my own place.

Having arrived overnight from Ho Chi Minh city (though I still prefer the old name Saigon), the day begins a little lazily on the beach resort of Da Nang. Our body was crying out for rest after having been consumed with too many of people, traffic, pollution of Saigon. Eager to get to Hoi An, a rented, mildly scratched red and black automatic Honda does the trick as we ride cautiously down the chaotic roads, zipping along the palm-fringed road and negotiating with ease the heavy traffic that stayed with us for a while. Once there, I felt that I had arrived somewhere exotic. The city by far is quite small, but as it turned out, it was one great adventure, which was very exhaustive considering the innumerable treasures it had to offer.

The first thing that greets you is silence, romantically wrapped in shades of yellow as you breathe the musky scent of incense. Solitary cyclist in the otherwise empty lanes, peddling between low height houses – the present seems to cut through the middle of history. With no fear of cars running you down, this city makes every pedestrian feel safe.

It is still early and we are hungry. Amidst the flying dust and sounds of the broom on the road, young schoolchildren rush past with bells on their bicycles as one can hear the chirping of the birds. It seems like one great morning symphony.

Finding the nearest café, we leave the order to a young waitress, who in any case was finding it difficult to understand what we were saying. In a few minutes, we are served food as I relish the sight of the morning sun spilling in a bowl full of Cao La. I can taste the orient and the occident in the yellow-tinged fat rice noodles, unique to the town of Hoi An. They say this signature noodle dish is the history of a city in a bowl and I am eager to explore the unique culinary tapestry of this ancient town.

Men in ao ba ba "(street pyjamas)" peddling empty rickshaws tempt us to hitch a ride, but we decide to walk traverse the labyrinth of this ancient town on our feet.

Taking umbrage under profusely flowering bougainvillaea's in reds and purple standing in a line along the sepiatinted lanes; I catch a few notes of music slithering past the blue windows on yellow walls. The dreamy golden facades, watermarks on the ochre walls along with weather-beaten contrasts of blue and green are coming alive with the Vietnamese sun. Housing nearly 1000 ancient buildings, Hoi an embraces you with its mixed architecture – Chinese, colonial European and the very old Japanese.

My camera is eager to be engaged, as I stand transfixed between the overwhelming juxtaposition of the magic of light playing hide and seek on the ying-yang of the terra cotta tiles on the rooftops, casting its impressions on the ground with their silhouettes. There is a story in every angle, history in every detail and poetry in every movement.

The river road of Thuo Bon is slowly awakening, opening its arms to the rising sun as it marks its prominent presence in the landscape of the town. Finding a quiet coffee café on the riverbank, I decide to sit for a while to observe the activities of late morning. My imagination gets to the better of me as I try and visualize boats laden with merchandise sailing centuries ago to and fro from China making a stopover in the today's fishing village somewhere where I am sitting. The remnants of old days and present-day eateries make an interesting and vibrant collage.

Ordering a ca phe, I decide to try the local Vietnamese take of tiramisu. It really was not my "cup of coffee" as I settled for a simpler version of sweet black coffee with condensed milk Ca Phe Sua Non. Coffee in Vietnam is one good example of how the locals absorbed the French influence and eventually tailored the ingredients with their own to create some great culinary delights.

Intimate experiences in a historic

setting are what Hoi An is all about. Being a focal point of trade Asia and Europe, one can find many cultural influences in this small town. After the revolution of 1600 ended, the Vietnamese and Chinese rebuilt the city whilst the Japanese side remained in ruins. The French colonization of Hoi An transformed itself to "Ville de Faifo". The French-Indochina influences can be seen clearly in its colonial structures of the villas and other buildings in the south

side of the old town Walking through the underrated alleys, I find myself in front of a small shop lined with photographs of Hoi An, mostly black and white. There are a few that show Vietnamese people with their faces obscured wearing non la, the conical hats peddling sampans and canoes in deluged and submerged lanes of Hoi An. Intrigued, I walk over and to an old man sitting behind a glass table cleaning an antique-looking camera. Asking about these floods images, he shares his experience of the great flood of 1964.He lay trapped on the first floor of the building without any food or water but with great opportunities of documenting the tragedy and spirit of survival of the town. He said, "floods waters touch our doorstep almost every year but 1964 showers of rain were probably all years merged in one ".

The young boy who had taken iconic shots on a day when "heaven fell to earth", by now had greyed just like these photographs. I am thankful to be on dry feet. Somewhere I had read "Hoi An is three months of misery, and nine months of sunshine". Being there in between the suffocating heat and endless rain was timed perfectly, except that warning that echoed in the city of the forthcoming storm expected next day. For now, the sun was shining and the green moss on the yellow buildings had started to smile.

Recharged and rejuvenated, I am ready for the wooden Chinese temples, Japanese merchant houses, and the yellow, which is turning mustard as the sun climbs on top of my head. The influence of sea and spice seem to come alive in the city, which was once part of the spice route and a trading stop.

Strangely I was hungry again and decided to take a break from the lemon-coloured walls and the streaking sunshine. Finding myself a café next to the old Japanese bridge, an iconic structure constructed in the 16th century, this bridge connected the Japanese community with the Chinese quarters. I decide to revisit the bridge when the lights come on.

But for now, I am hungry and tired and could do with some good food. Settling for an extended stay at the café, I decided to go slow and order a bowl of "pho". Soon enough, a steaming bowl is sitting







before me as I close my eyes and inhale deeply the aroma of ginger, coriander and spring onions. Thick rice flat noodles lie interspersed with meat strips and dotted with the greens, the edges of red inside the bowl stand out in utter contrast. Savouring the National dish of Vietnam slowly, the tiredness seems to be ebbing away from my limbs.

It is tempting to try more of delicious French-influenced dishes and settle on "bánh mi" as the main course. The aromatic juicy stir-fried pork tossed with a handful of fresh herbs, lemongrass and fried rice is like a small culinary celebration on my table. The French got the baguettes, which carries a combination of Vietnamese penchant for green herbs and raw vegetables combined with the French influences of meat and pâté.

That is one good thing about being in Hoi An – walk – eat, walk – eat and you could go on as long as you like. This seemed to be the perfect place to do both, back to back.

I try to find my way to the main market through the banana pancake carts and swarms of tourists who seem to have suddenly swooped in the town. From the quieter sojourn, I suddenly find myself engulfed with sights, sounds and smell of endless lines of spices, raw meat and tables laden with fruits. Live ducks quacking, bargaining voices, fragrant herbs, baskets laden with yellow and orange marigolds – smiles, shouts and laughter, the soul of the town lay bare, here in the central market. Holding bags of fruits and spices, I make a quick exit from the market madness.

There is something that happens at almost every corner of the old town. I catch glimpses of girl students. They come in small swarms of white, a few walking and some cycling, their dark hair curled up under the conical hat. If I had to single out one image from the memory lane of Hoi An, it would be this young girl dressed in ao dai who slipped so silently in my camera frame. The white moving so slowly against the cracked, peeling yellow wall, the square

of her shoulders, geometric shape of her hat and the fluid line of her ao dai – all fall as a pool of reflection in the river, merging the past and present, an allegory of melancholy.

"How much"? - The almost hysterical high-pitched question breaks my reverie of thoughts as I see a young lady showing a photograph of a bridal dress inside a tailor shop. It is then it dawns on me that this city is full of talents, tailoring being a very important one. Hoi An tailors, who can replicate, stitch anything in less than two days record time at less than one fourth the price.

It is then I realize that this ancient city is a haven for couture conscious tourists. Having little interest in getting suits stitched, I take a quick bow and find myself back in a recherché alley where a solitary cat looks up at me questioningly.

Walking through the new streets, I duck in the blue and white ateliers those house museums, cafes and artist workshops. This section of the city offers a different glimpse of history where ancient houses open their doors and I feel as I am entering a different world. Old books, pottery, different works of art on display; one just cannot enough.

By now the darkness has started to descend as the boats light up casting their hues in the river. A few floating candles sail past me as the silk lanterns that dot the city start awakening in their own rhapsody of colours.


It feels that time has stopped except for the spiralling smoke of cigarettes, laced with the strong aroma of coffee; conversations that sound peppy start to fill the streets. Finding myself a plastic chair at a café situated amidst a row of French colonial houses, I have a cold Vietnamese beer.

By now the lanterns have begun their gypsy dance against an inking sky. The lazy rivers lined with merchant houses are all lit up. I decided to revisit the Japanese bridge to take a night shot and find myself lucky to not have tourists around. Jealous, I am for not having enough time in this city and blame myself for underrating Hoi



An and not giving it the appreciation and reverence it deserves. The stars above seduce my senses - a timeless city that has not moved on continues to celebrate its cultures and traditions. It beckons me to surrender to its poetic charm.

I also knew that the road with its dreadful traffic to Da Nang was waiting for me. In this pause, I remain and in this pause, I leave, knowing that I have to return, to honour the living history of Hoi An.



he terrorist attacks earlier this year in Colombo had hit The Tourism industry of Sri Lanka hard. The country is trying hard to revive it back. So I decided to support the beautiful country by revisiting there once again as a SOLO Traveller and here is my take on it.

After reaching the Airport I soon realized, is not just an airport, it's yet another pulse, yet another story, yet another tale to tell. The hustle bustle, the anxiety, the confusion, one doesn't get to see the calmness, till the time one crosses the security check.

On being landed in the Buddha's Land, the drive from the Airport till Bentota Hotel, the highway made me feel that I am in the south of India, a combination of Kerala, Coorg and Goa I guess. It was a beautiful, smooth highway, with minimal and disciplined traffic. I felt am in a very familiar 'unfamiliar Zone'.

Reached my Hotel The Centara Ceysands Resort and spa- Oh what a lovely location and such a scenic view. One needs to cross the River by a boat to reach the Hotel. The hotel's location is ideal which the Bentota beach on the other is in the middle of river on one end. It felt like a paradise.

In room dining experience was one of the best as lovely and extremely delicious plate of food arrived when I was down and out with the long travel. The chef took care my personal choices and I had one of the best coconut Panna-cotta with a poached peach which reminded me of master chef Australia. The taste of deliciousness will remain with me for a long time.

Next day I went out to explore the south coast and I took the Matara highway.

My first stop was The Mirissa Island. It is a very popular beach with deep blue waters and blue whales, often called a blue beach. My eyes were gazed for a long time at the waving shore saying hello to me. I remember I stood still for a long

time trying to capture the beauty in heart forever. I could not peel my eyes away from dreamy thick palms. It's an Island spoilt for places to eat and grab a drink. The Island is a good host to a vibrant and active night life with beach parties that go on from dusk till dawn. With a golden sandy stretches meeting the shoreline, the seaside activities are for everyone, both young and old. After spending some time there I headed for the Weligama bay beach which is very famous for surfing between the sparkling seas, smiling locals, sweeping palms and abundant ocean life there are spectacular surf breaks that range from punchy reef breaks and rolling barrels to flowing beginner waves. Weligama bay is known by many as a beach for beginners'. Many locals and visitors have begun their surfing career right amongst these gentle beach breaks. After spending some time there I made my way to the lively beaches of Hikkaduwa and Unawatuna, the latter being voted as one of the best 10 beaches in the world by Discovery Channel and National geographic too. The entire beach experience was enough to keep my soul fulfilled for a long time.

As hungry as I was to let my feet ache for more, my eyes searching for more, I headed for The Galle Road.


What actually stole my heart was The Hotel Amangalla on Galle Road, No it was not a luxury, it was beyond the Luxury, it was a royalty. I could feel, touch relive the moments of extravagance of Dutch times. The property still holds the same antique furniture which is more than 150 years old made from teak wood. The reins of the Dutch culture, the Dutch Church (built in 1755), the Museum. Galle is a vibrant city that embraces its ancient culture and colonial past. Galle is famous for its fortifications. Perhaps the best example of the South Asian fortified city built by Europeans, the fort is remarkable collection of structures and culture which date back though the centuries. The city was the main port for over 200 years following the construction of fort in the 17th century.

The driver then took me the famous Buddha statue which was made in memory











for the loss of lives when the country was hit with the cyclone in 2004. Before that the country did not hear the word cyclone as told by the locals there. I did get a lot of opportunity to have conversations with the locals there who I felt majorly were humble, polite, low level of income group yet very peaceful and hopeful and happy with the new govt. being formed.

I very much wanted to enjoy my stay in the Resort which in one of the most ideal locations as the name Centara suggests 'central water'. It is a Thai chain of hotels with interiors of Sri Lankan articulate Batik decoration. Entwining of the heritage can be seen in the resort with the focus on maintaining the natural green surroundings.

My room was river facing view and the Morning sun shining though the ripples of the water as if the water is shining through is enough to keep you calm peaceful, happy and sums up the reason for a Solo Journey. Chirpy sound of birds, occasional sound of






the boat engine, flute humming somewhere far away reminds us of the moving life. The silent sound of the ripples had long conversations with me.

The evenings in the resort were filled with enjoying live music, the local bear, all kinds of cuisines, swim, spa, activities if interested. It is enough to keep one occupied the way one wants to be.

My beach walk on the Bentota beach just outside the hotel was very memorable one as the waters were crystal clear, I being an early riser gave me a chance to experience the sunrise and the sunshine colours merging with waves gave me the imagination of the orange waves far away, an amalgamation of colours of the sky. The dancing waves gave the glimpses of occasional whales dancing somewhere far away. It is a no disturbing beach where no sellers, no commercialization, just plain and simple ocean to sink in and soak yourself in the wet sand.

The local cuisine journey began with Thambili which is the orange coconut often













called the king coconut to quench one's thirst. Sri lanka also boast of around 22 varieties of bananas, local cuisines, one could enjoy the string hoppers which is the compresses rice noodles, hoppers which is similar to our very own dosa. Since the country is a global tourist destination, there is very wide variety of food culture and choices from one of the best sea foods, Mediterranean , Thai, Japanese, Europeans, Grilled cuisines, Asian cuisines and also Indian The food choices spoil you to the core and palate perpetual hungry.

The country also boast of some the best semiprecious stones the very special blue moon stone which the locals tell me are to be found only in their country. Got the glimpse of the mine factory and how the stones are extracted was the experience worth noticing and remembering.

The Brief Garden- Geoffery Mannin Bawa's work, really motivated me to look closely. I was told by the caretaker that Bawa was blind for the last 10 years of his life. He explored modernism and its cultural implications, created a unique style of design which had a lasting impact on architects across the world. He was one of the original proponents of Tropical Modernization. Some of the best architectural photographs in Sri lanka and around the worlds have created iconic images of Bawa's buildings.

COLOMBO-

The Hotel Kingsbury was a good one, upgraded me to the executive lunge, gave me a concierge and had a special lounge for personal morning breakfast, personal check in, check out facility, unlimited

access to the evening snacks with the wide choices of drinks to choose from. Another personal attention to the details the Hotel provides are the description pillows to suits your needs. They have the Organic, hug, latex and Kapok pillows to choose from. The hotel has a good spa centre and I enjoyed my Thai spa there with well trained staff. Despite my continuous cultural hunger, Colombo is vibrant and full of ideas. I aked the local to show their Colombo. From a home cooked meal to vintage jewelers, Colpetty Market



The Essential SOLO TRIP TO THE LAND OF MERLION

ave you watched the movie 'Love, Actually'? The opening scene at Heathrow Airport had stayed in my mind, and I expected a similar experience when I returned, only to come back to a rainy Monday morning, with an exam scheduled three hours after the landing, sleep-deprived, and carrying new skills in my arsenal.

Singapore. A crazy, terrific, and unforgettable trip. As it happened, I travelled to the city-state located at Malay Peninsula's southern tip in April. The equatorial climate meant humidity and high temperatures all day long, with frequent bouts of rain throughout the day. One of the busiest ports in the world owing to its proximity to the Strait of Malacca, Singapore became an independent state in 1965. It has a history of British colonisation, and on August 09, 1965, it seceded the Federation of Malaysia to become independent. The population today comprises of Chinese, Malays, and Indians.

I had a morning flight. Wide awake throughout the fly time, I read my novel, watched a few episodes of a TV show, and could not resist being in awe of the relief features underneath. The mountains with their snow caps, rivers meandering like a child's painting and the Sun playing hide and seek with the clouds, isn't the nature full of beauty? After the immigration at Changi Airport, I went to the hotel on Nanson Road, a short cab-ride away. With the Singapore River at the front and Mass Rapid Transit station close by, the Nanson Road houses many hotels and restaurants,

and a 7-Eleven convenience store.

The next day was exciting. I went to Sentosa Island. Children, their parents, and an old couple from Canada were running inside the premises to reach Universal Studios. I was transported to a different world as Transformers, Minions, Elmo from Sesame Street, Shrek and Princess Fiona took my breath away. Universal Studios Singapore opened in 2011 and has been a significant centre of attraction for one and all. The tickets are priced dearly but are indeed worth the experience.

Of the roller coasters featured here, the one on 'Revenge of Mummy' is the most thrilling. The Transformers themed rides are visible as you enter, and are a must-do for all adrenaline rush lovers. Meet and Greet your favourite characters when here, in addition to attending live shows. You can meet Marilyn Monroe, Charlie Chaplin, Minions, Frankenstein's monster, Betty Boop, Master Ping Xiao Po from Kung Fu Panda, and so many others. I loved the water show hosted in The Lost World zone, where gravity-defying stunts were performed along with occasional drenching. I hope you remember Jurassic Park; you can get up, close and personal with the dinos in Jurassic Park Rapids Adventure in a white-water circular raft. Then there's Madagascar zone and Steven Spielberg's 'Lights Camera Action' show, not to be missed attractions. And, do keep your schedule flexible to attend the street parade, it is unforgettably fun.

If you are at Sentosa, visit the S.E.A. Aquarium. It houses over 100,000 marine animals, and you can get experience





of diving too. It is tranquil to get lost in admiring the magnificence that the sea holds for us. Heads up, literally and figuratively, as one looks at sharks crossing overhead. It is exhilarating; it is one of its kind. What else, Sentosa has the Palawan Beach, which has the famed 'Southernmost

point of continental Asia.' You need to cross a suspension bridge from Palawan Beach to reach Palawan Island, and click pictures next to the signage. The sign is beautiful, the place around is charming, and the factual matter is debated, giving Tanjung Piai in Malaysia 'the southernmost point

of Asia' tag. There is Fort Siloso close by, which has World War 2 memorabilia- there are guns, tunnels, military structures, and video documentaries. There is a skywalk too. It is a military museum open to the public for free.

Then there's the Trick Eye Museum. Before you reach here, download the official app to your phone and then march in to click 3D pictures on your device-you could be dancing in the rain with a handsome gentleman, or in the company of a polar bear out to hunt and satiate thirst. Do not miss the floor either, for the Trick Eye Museum has many tricks up its sleeve. From bridge crossings to alligators, and rooms which shift upside down, the museum is an interestingly designed space.

It was dark when I exited the museum, and a helpful official suggested that I stay a few more minutes to attend the 'crane dance.' Machines turn into birds in love

as the spectacular performance is put up by the cranes. A light and water show, depicting how two machines meet and ascend into real birds, I am glad I did not miss it. Arrive 20-30 minutes before the show begins to secure a seat with a clear view. It is a daily performance at 2000 hrs.

The next day, I visited The Merlion, official mascot of Singapore, located at the Merlion Park. Walk to the park from the Raffles Place MRT station, and get ready to pose and click as you stand atop the bridge on Singapore River, with Marina Bay Sands Hotel, the Float (floating football ground) and Singapore flyer at front, and hotels and office buildings on the side. The 8.6m tall statue has the form of half a lion, half a fish, and sprouts water from its mouth. There is one smaller statue present behind the original one.

That was followed by shopping on Orchard Street, accessible by the MRT. There's Burberry, Bulgari, Chanel, Louis Vuitton, Hermès, and many other upscale stores here, in addition to departmental stores and food outlets. A short walk away was the Far East Plaza, where I went shopping and lunch. Thanks to the ladies I met in the elevator who suggested Puncak Restaurant, I could eat to my heart's delight. A Malaysian mother and her two little kids sat next to me, and when I told her about the kind of food I wanted to eat, she suggested me to go with curry chicken. Delicious beyond words, the meal was complete with the restaurant owners' sweet words and generous guide to travel. Uncle, aunty, their daughter, all talked to me and suggested where to travel, how to reach there, our families et al. When the spices hit the right note, and I started coughing, aunty quickly offered me her beer to soothe, which I humbly denied being a teetotaller. She gave me some lime water then and fed me too. I video called my mumma, who back home was worried if her puttar had eaten something, and was glad to know that I had my tummy full. Mothers, they never stop worrying about the food, right?

Next on the itinerary was the Night Safari, the world's first nocturnal zoo. It is an open-air zoo set amidst a tropical forest, where animals roam free and can be observed in their habitat. There are 7



geographical zones present within which can be explored on foot or in a tram. The lights are dim enough not to disturb the behaviour of the animals. From tigers and Indian rhinoceros to Asian elephants and pangolins, over a thousand animals from 120 species are present here, separated from humans by natural barriers instead of cages. 'Creatures of the Night' show is a must-attend, spanning about 30 minutes. There are civets, otters, snakes, and owls, among many other animals. Do not use the flashlight of your cameras here, it disturbs the animals. Yet another show I attended was the Thumbuakar Performance at the entrance. It's a fire show, attuned to the beats of jungle drum, as one gets wowed by the fire-throwing skills of the pyro warriors.

I reached the hotel at around 2300 hrs, and was glad to see the place lively and peppy. There are designated places to drink and smoke. As a solo traveler, I had my concerns which vanished into thin air as I helped myself to some sea food while my watch struck midnight. I talked to other travellers who suggested that I try the Singapore Cruise and Jurong Bird Park. I

walked to the Clarke Quay; mesmerising lights danced on the waters as a river cruise was being conducted on it.

The next morning's clear sky altered the plan a little. So, I hopped into a capsule of the giant observatory wheel for a 360-degree view from Singapore Flyer. It felt slow at first, but that thought swiftly transformed into a relaxed "ooh" as my eyes and mind eased over the splendid panoramic views. 28 capsules, with a maximum capacity of 28 persons, is a good luck charm in Feng Shui. The giant wheel is 165 m high and soothes your senses like no other. It is enchanting how simple things feel when close to us, and are a marvel when we look at them from a height. The atrium below houses a rainforest, where a pond and cascading waters fuse to give a lush green appearance.

Walk out of the flyer towards the Marina Bay Sands Hotel, and be greeted by the Gardens by the Bay. A nature park, it comprises of 3 waterfront gardens- Bay South, Bay East, and Bay Central. The world's largest glass greenhouse is here at Flower Dome. There are two cooled conservatories- Flower Dome and Cloud

Forest. Rainwater is collected from the surface and circulated in the cooling system connected to the Supertrees. The latter is used to vent hot air and cool the circulated water. These Supertrees are home to another aspect, which I shall talk about later. The Lost World, the Cloud Mountain, Children's Garden, and various Horticultural themed gardens are present



here. Take a full day to explore the gardens well; there's so much learn and admire, not to forget, the architectural marvel that the

Back to the Supertrees. You remember Super Mario and its theme song? Dear reader, walk the OCBC Skyway, take in the views around, enjoy that feeling. Come down and lay on the grass. It's evening, it's growing dark, and you are all set for an experience you won't forget. "When the night falls, be enchanted as the vertical gardens come alive," says the host. At 1945 hrs and 2045 hrs each night, the Supertrees tell a different story. There is a light and sound show, called the 'Garden Rhapsody,' to the tunes of Super Mario and other popular music. If you do not want to pay for the Skyway, you can still enjoy the light and sound show. Walk into the gardens timely and take a seat on the ground, it's free. I remember being spellbound during the first show, so I attended the second one as well to make a video. I lay under the star-studded sky, letting go of every fragment of worry, and enjoyed the show to the fullest.

I had to visit the Buddha Tooth Relic Temple and Museum the next morning. The temple is 5 storeyed, and the Buddha Mandala has inspired the building's design. The third floor has revered artefacts, bone and tongue relics, and the fourth floor has the tooth. These relics have been recovered from the funeral pyre of Buddha in Kushinagar, India. There are a hundred

to eat chicken with chopsticks. I also had

















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Sun Soaked **SEVILLE**



The basics of pairing food & wine!

Matching wine with different cuisines and flavor can be confusing. This article will cover some of the key facts to assist you to become a more knowledgeable judge in selecting the wines with the food you are eating.

Focus on balance with flavors of food & wine

Wine and food should be best buddies, with neither over powering the other. For example:

The lighter foods requires there partner to be a delicate wine, so the flavors in the dish are not being overpowered. This means having lamb with a white wine would not match traditionally, with each having such distinct flavors in their own ways.

You would not have a red wine with a creamy white pasta sauce, as the flavors and taste of both wine and the dish will stand out in their own characteristics. WINE GRAPES & FOOD PAIRING WITH **CATEGORIES**

Acidity: In wine tasting, the term "acidity" refers to the fresh, tart and sour attributes of the wine.

Sweetness: That sweet sugar sensation is mainly due to the sugar content in the wine. This ranges typically form 0 % to 20 % in both red & white wines. Alcohol itself is also a sweet liquid, so higher alcohol wines can give the perception of a 'sweet'

Bitterness: Bitter tastes in wines should be very limited. Bitter tastes can come from extremely young wines that have not matured. 1

ne Old City of Jerusalem has become more accessible for both wheelchair users and the visually impaired, thanks to improved infrastructure and audio apps to help residents and visitors better navigate the small streets and alleyways of the Old City. The accessibility of the Old City is an innovative and groundbreaking project that enables wheelchair-bound residents and visitors to enjoy the historic and cultural wealth of the city. Among other things, four kilometers of streets in the Muslim, Armenian and Christian guarters were adapted, and about 2 kilometers of handrails were installed alongside staircases. The accessibility is carried out with the cooperation of the merchants and the residents of the area.


The Old City of Jerusalem and its walls are a UNESCO World Heritage Site and therefore are subject to special preservation rules designed to present the city and its heritage to its visitors while developing and upgrading it to the benefit of its residents and employees. The Old City is the most visited place in Israel with about 10 million visitors each year.

The accessibility of the picturesque alleys of the Old City is intended to ease the congestion in the main streets and to enable wheelchair users, the users of freight carts (including strollers), and other handicapped people, to visit the city's tourist attractions with greater ease. Facilitation includes: Roads fixing; Fixing and renovation of public services (including accessible); Adding direction and explanatory signs to the main sites and spatial maps along the main tourist

routes; Upgrading the current cleaning and garbage collection system; Replacement of stone cladding; Highlighting historical or archaeological findings of public interest; Installation of infrastructure cladding for water clocks and a garbage collection point in the tourist area according to the "street language"; Renewal of business complexes facades and facilities along the route; And the completion of promenades from Zion Gate to the Dung Gate along the northern outer wall. The Tower of David Museum, located at the gateway to the Old City, has made its flagship night show, known to all for its spectacular visual content, accessible to the blind and visually impaired with a descriptive audio accompaniment – the first of its kind in Israel. In conjunction with the Central Library for the Blind and Visually Impaired, an audio description (in Hebrew and English) narrates each scene presented in the show, which depicts each different historical period. The uniqueness of audio description is that it is embedded in the Night Experience's screening technology automatically, and is delivered through cordless headphones which are

The Tower of David Museum also runs special tours for visitors who are visually impaired where visitors get to feel "history" by having hands-on experiences, touching the different faced stones from the time periods of the city's history from

the stone masonry from 2000 years ago and King Herod's elegant huge blocks of stones to the rougher stones from the Crusader's time period and onwards. The Museum also had models of Jerusalem that show the development of the city as well as a model of the actual citadel itself allowing visitors who may not be able to see the development of the city - feel and listen to the history of the city unravel.

The Old City accessibility project is being funded by the Jerusalem and Heritage Ministry and the Jerusalem Development Authority, together with the Ministry of Tourism, the Accessibility Department of the Jerusalem Municipality, the National Social Security Agency and the Israel Antiquities Authority, carried out by the East Jerusalem Development Company and accompanied by accessibility consultants according to local topographical restrictions, at a cost of over 20 million NIS. 1

Natalis: Usually takes place during the first week or so of December at the Feira Internacional de Lisboa. Here, you'll find more than 180 companies and charities selling everything you could possibly need for a very Merry Christmas!

Óbidos: It is a small town about one hour drive north of Lisbon, and is worth seeing as it transforms itself into a Christmas village with ice-skating, an ice slide, a fairground, inflatables, face painting, and Santa's house. It truly resembles Santa's home in the North Pole.

Funchal Christmas Market: This market has been already classified as one of the best in Europe. In this market in the heart of the Madeira Islands capital, one can discover a wide variety of products including exotic flowers and other traditional souvenirs, while sampling some of the typical dishes and drinks of the season and listen to choirs sing Christmas Carols. Various folklore groups dance every night. It starts on 1 December and ends on 7 January 2018.

Viseu: A Christmas market takes place every year at Rossio square in Viseu and fills this city in the center of Portugal region with lights and magic. In this market, there are always warm drinks, regional products for sale, handicraft and chocolates.

The arrival of Christmas: On November 30th, Porto officially connects to Christmas. The moment is marked on its main street Avenida dos Aliados with various entertainment events such as the performances of well-known Portuguese bands. The lights and the Christmas Tree switch on at 6 pm, with a multimedia show, produced especially for the ceremony and it will culminate with the switch on of the lights and the inauguration of the Christmas Tree. Decorated with 31,600 LED lamps, it will be 30 meters high, weighing about 16.4 tons.

Aldeia De Natal, Vila Real De Santo António: Vila Real de Santo António normally hosts a Christmas village at the Praça Marquês de Pombal. Expect an ice rink, a fair with handicrafts and traditional foods, live music, and a visit from Santa himself.

wine fair. 1










ABOUT PORTUGAL

Shinrin-yoku was developed in the 1980s in Japan. Although people had been taking walks in the forests for centuries all over the world. A chemical released by trees and plants, called phytoncides, was found to boost the immune system. As more research highlighted the benefits of shinrin-yoku, the Japanese government incorporated it into the country's health

A better way to frame forest bathing is, " mindful time spent under the canopy of trees for health and wellbeing purposes." In the 1990s, researchers began studying the physiological benefits of forest bathing, providing the science to support what we innately know: time spent immersed in nature is good for us. While Japan is credited with the term shinrin-yoku, the concept at the heart of the practice is not new. Many cultures have long recognized the importance of the natural world to human health.

Forest bathing is not just for the wilderness-lover; the practice can be as simple as walking in any natural





environment and consciously connecting with what's around you. For a more structured experience, you can join trained guides for a meditative two to three hour eco-therapy excursion.

Some of the best places on this planet to practice Forest bathing are Adirondack Mountains in New York, Costa Rica, Kenya, Hawaii and New Zealand.

New Zealand has some jewels such as the beautiful Waipoua forest in the North Island where the oldest and largest Kauri trees in the world live. Sacred to Māori people, Kauri is considered "protectors of the forest." Footprints Waipoua organizes walks among the kauri trees including the Twilight Encounter, led by Māori guides.

However to experience forest bathing from a bird's eye perspective, you can come and experience Redwoods Treewalk in Rotorua, New Zealand. This suspended ecological walk captures the beauty and ambience of the forest and is a beautiful destination for nature lovers and soul searchers.

Nuture your mind, body and soul while you bathe in the lust green settings offered by Mother Nature.

The Daytime treewalk is an immersive, breathtaking and extraordinary 40 min trail on suspended bridges open to families and all that can walk unaided. The bridges range from heights of 9 to 20 meters giving extraordinary views of New Zealand's silver fern and exotic forests. This tranguil and serene walk caters to all fitness levels.

The Redwood Nightlife is a mesmerizing, magical and enchanting experience that offers a world class design led tourism by illuminating the entire tree walk with 30 lanterns exquisitely crafted from wood echoing back the design of the forest to create a wonderland and an out worldly experience.

The Redwoods Treewalk is situated within the majestic and magical Whakarewarewa Forest. 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The Belgadia Palace, **Mayurbhanj Odisha**

he Belgadia Palace is a 200-yearold renovated property in the erstwhile princely state of Mayurbhanj, India which opened earlier this year as a boutique homestay to build sustainable communities an initiative of the Bhanj Deo family.

The district of Mayurbhanj is very rich in its arts and culture - from endangered crafts such as Dokra (ancient wax casting art form) to Mayurbhanj Chhau (martial arts dance form) and the palace itself has art from renowned artists such as Hemendranath Majumdar and architecture nearby from the 8th and 14th century. Mayurbhanj and The Belgadia Palace are a hidden artists treasure trove and has housed many famous personalities as it was the erstwhile home to the royal family and built to house foreign dignitaries from Annie Beasant, Mark Shand (Late brother of Camilla Parker Bowles) Gyandendra Shah, the last King of Nepal, to J.N. Tata and Keshab Chandra Sen (Bengal Renaissance Reformer) among other famous personalities.

Introduction

Nestled amidst a lush green backdrop of rolling hills and sparkling waterfalls of the rich and diverse Eastern-Indian countryside is The Belgadia Palace. An 18th century victorian brick-built double-storey structure in the classical Western style of Doric-Corinthian column, a mixture of Greek and Victorian architecture. Home to the erstwhile royal family of Mayurbhanj,



this boutique homestay invites guests to take a trip down memory lane and introduces the idea of purposeful travel by engaging with the local tribal community and through curated tours to truly explore the state of Odisha, the soul of incredible India. This unique blend of old and new is encapsulated at this offbeat location which is an adventure-lovers paradise a few hours from the Simlipal, an Elephant and Tiger UNESCO Biosphere, the second largest national park in India.

History

The Belgadia Palace's construction began on the orders of Maharani Sumitra Devi Bhanj Deo in 1804, who ruled the state from 1796 to 1810. In phased development, the palace gets its aura of majesty with intricate designs being added during the rule of her descendents who used it as a royal guest house for state visitors. The present interiors are designed on the orders of the Bhanja dynasties most famous ruler Sri Ram Chandra Bhanj Deo, popularly known as 'The Philosopher King' for his second wife Maharani Sucharu Devi, daughter of Keshab Chandra Sen, founder of the Brahmo Samaj movement famous during the Bengal Rennaisance.

The palace sits on a raised hill overlooking sprawling lawns on either side, with the entrance highlighted by a long drive-in with indigenous flora and fauna dotting either side and ending at the Elephant Porch or "Hathi Baramdah", which is a high arched porch built to accommodate the ruler when he would mount the howdah on an elephant for ceremonial processions. The doublestoried mansion with turrets flanked on either side has rooms envisioned for work and leisure with the Maharajah and Maharani wing having black and white checkered marble verandahs overlooking the sprawling lawns, with the royal insignia embossed along with the glass windows. A natural lake is situated at one border and a manicured walking path criss crosses the entire estate. The open verandahs were meant to be viewing parlors for the women of the family to watch the chhau performances at the main lawn, a martial arts dance form that was practiced by the state military and flourished under the patronage of the erstwhile rulers.



The present renovation echoes the golden era of the state with furniture and upholstery being repurposed from the original palace. The original palace's (which is now a college) exterior was built to be a replica of The Bukingham Palace. The annals of history come alive with vintage vinyl records, persian carpets, old world chandeliers and century old oil paintings placed along the halls and porches of the estate. The paintings and art around the palace juxtapose the untamed and ethereal beauty of the district. Nothing like the smell of monsoons hitting the red laterite soil as you lounge in the verandah enjoying the natural landscape!

The suites offer hints and whispers of a royal era with the dark winding mahogany staircase at the lobby draped with a red carpet used for receiving the Maharajah, connecting the first floor rooms to the upper chambers. With each step into the palace the jewel toned colors have a soothing effect with soft wooden finishes transporting you to a bygone era.

The Belgadia Palace

The palace's restoration to its former glory included landscaping of its surrounding, fruit and flower orchards and an organic farm for a fresh array of local cuisines served on embossed cutlery. The careful restoration of its interiors was done in stages keeping in mind the unique pieces of furniture and furnishings handcrafted for the family. Additionally, the rooms have antiques and collections of artwork belonging to the royal family from their travels around the world. The modern and lux design of its interior contrasts the ancient and ornate architecture of its exterior making the property and its surroundings a walk through the annals of history.

The present-day occupants of the palace, apart from the Maharajah, include the present Queen mother and the Queen of Mayurbhanj who belongs to the royal families of Nepal and Jaisalmer respectively. Each of them brings their own aesthetic to the unique interiors which include 10 rooms, each designed to highlight the numerous personalities who have either visited the Palace or have connections to the erstwhile royal family of Mayurbhanj.

CHOCOLATES



India is a country where majority of people have a sweet tooth. Everyone loves chocolates, but do people know the difference between a real and a fake chocolate? Can a chocolate also be fake? Fake chocolate is termed as 'compound chocolate' whereas real chocolate is termed as 'couverture chocolate'.

Let us look into it deeper and see where chocolate comes from and how it is made. Chocolate comes from cacao pods. Cacao pods contain cocoa beans. Cocoa beans are cleaned properly and then roasted. This step removes moisture, adds flavor and also adds color. After the beans are roasted, they are broken down into pieces This process is known as Micronizing. Micronizing the cocoa beans permits the next step which is Winnowing. Winnowing helps to separate shells from the nibs. After the shells are separated, the nibs are ground and the mass that we get is known as cocoa liquor. Sugar, milk solids, vanilla, cocoa butter etc. are mixed at this stage. Before the 'real' chocolate is delivered to the customer there are 4 more steps until the chocolate is ready to consume. As you can see, making couverture chocolate is very expensive. It is very difficult for any company to sell it at an affordable price point unless they have a huge production setup. In order to sell cheap chocolates at an affordable price, compound chocolate was introduced.

What makes this chocolate cheap? It is the substitution of cocoa butter. Cocoa butter is extracted from the cocoa liquor and it is substituted with cheaper fats-like Vegetable fats. This cuts down the cost of the chocolate to approximately one third. Hydrogenated Vegetable fat may sound like a very fancy word to you but that only means 'Dalda ghee' which takes years to get flushed from our system. Not only is

chocolate this cheap, it is also easy to use. The real or couverture chocolate contains cocoa butter which is first melted carefully on a double boiler and then tempered. Whereas compound chocolate does not need any tempering. One can straight away melt in a microwave or double boiler and

How can you tell if the chocolate you are eating is compound or couverture? Compound chocolate won't melt in your mouth instantly due to the absence of Cocoa Butter whereas couverture chocolate will melt in your mouth- as cocoa butter melts at body temperature. Also, after eating compound chocolate you may feel that your mouth got coated with a layer of fat. This just because of the cheaper version of fat which is used in that chocolate. However, in couverture chocolate one won't feel this due to the presence of cocoa butter.

The percentage on the chocolate indicates the ratio of cocoa solids to cocoa butter present in the chocolate. For example, 70% dark chocolate consists of 30% sugar and 55% dark chocolate consists of 45% sugar. The higher the percentage the less sweet and more intense the chocolate will be. Even if two different chocolates have the same percentage, they can differ in sweetness, flavor, and intensity. The bean varieties vary in sweetness and flavor, but different chocolate makers add different amounts of cocoa butter to their chocolate, which affects sweetness and intensity. My advice for the readers would be to always go for a 70%-80% dark chocolate if you want to have a good quality chocolate. Even Milk Chocolate contains hidden sugars, flavorings, preservatives etc. The are all added in the mixing stage of chocolate. 1



You have to get up early, and step out onto the terrace. For it is now that the


















